Marsiya is elegy in Urdu, Meer Anees made name in writing the marsiyas on the massacre of Hazrath Imam Hussain and his family members in Karbala. These are some Beautiful Marsiyas of eminent scholars like Dagh Ghalib and Molana Hali.

Masnavi is a sort of epic poem consisting of several hundred verse, Meer Hasan and Meer Asar are our noteworthy poets in this branch of poetry. As regards prose forms we have very few drama writers. Nevertheless Urdu has noted drama writer like Agha Hashar Kashmiri, Imtiyaz Ali Taj, dr Abid Hussain, Prof Mujeeb and noted Urdu short story writer Krishna Chandar who wrote "Darwaze Khol Do"
